Museum Division Hosts Maritime Museums Forum at Piney Point

Despite the dismal day, and for some a very long drive, 17 maritime museum professionals

trekked to the Piney Point Lighthouse, Museum and Historic Park for the annual Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museums Forum held inside the Potomac River Maritime Exhibit on October 25.

They came from Baltimore, Maryland's Eastern Shore, Washington, D.C., as well as Southern Maryland, representing a who's who of museums, organizations, and vessels with a unique and significant role in maritime history. Representatives came from the U.S. Navy Museum, Fell's Point Maritime Museum, Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum, the USS Constellation, the Baltimore Museum of Indus-



tries, the Baltimore Steam Tug, the Maryland Historical Society, Cultural Resources Management, Calvert Marine Museum, Historic St. Mary's City, and the Point Lookout Lighthouse Preservation Society. The highlight of the forum is the roundtable of news, events, special

projects, and specific challenges that each professional shares about their institution or organization. As always, there was a showcase of diverse challenges such as keeping wooden vessels afloat; photographing, archiving, and storing thousands of vessel documents and blueprints; preparing for re-accreditation; repairing and preserving a tug boat; coping with budget cuts; finding new quarters for collections; and fundraising for special projects and exhibits.

Stuart Parnes, director of the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum

in St. Michael's, MD, shared an exciting announcement. As the Secretary General for the International Congress of Maritime Museums (ICMM), he told the group that the ICMM is slated to hold its 2009 meet-

Building Associations, Partnerships, and Projects

Developing and maintaining relationships with some of the many professional organizations is crucial for staff development and institution health. Museums are similar to all other industries with technology, methodology, and professional protocol changing regularly. It is imperative that museum staffs and volunteers have and take the opportunities to keep their skills and knowledge of their work as current as possible.

Over the past few years the Museum Division has become increasingly involved with other cultural institutions and initiatives, including:

• The Southern Maryland Museum Association, a loose forum of museum staff and directors representing sites from Anne Arundel, Prince George's, Charles, Calvert and St. Mary's Counties. The meetings are generally held every other month at different sites around the region. Plans for events, exhibits, financial and political issues are brought to the table and openly discussed over a lunch-time format. We seldom solve problems but everyone listening gets a plethora of ideas based on the attendees' professional experiences. • Our seat on the **Maryland Historic Trust's Museum Enhancement Advisory Board** gives participants a firsthand glimpse at projects and plans being pursued by institutions around the state. Generally 12 museum professionals meet 3-4 times a year with the Division's Director, Mary Alexander, to review grant applications, develop application guidelines and rating criteria and in separate committee discuss state funding issues.

• As Museum Division manager, I am often invited to participate with key county officials such as Teri Wilson, our Historic Preservation Planner; Carolyn Laray, our Tourism Manager; and Roz Racanello, Executive Director of the Southern Maryland Heritage Area Consortium on a variety of advisory boards. Among our tasks have been planning the SMC Charlotte Hall Welcome Center to devising methods to preserve and interpret the two remaining buildings left in the Flat Tops area of Lexington Park. Most recently, I sat on an advisory committee to develop an application for funding to institute a National Freedom Byways trail through Charles and St. Mary's Counties.

Former museum director Mike Humphries was instrumental in building an excellent working relationship with the **American Association of Museums**, often serving the national museum organization in the capacity of an advisor. I brought a good working relationship with the **Chesapeake Bay Gateways Network** to my current position, serving as a volunteer on several advisory panels for that organization. All these connections help us develop greater expertise to better serve you.

Heritage Area Funds Provide Help in Many Ways

An initiative passed by the Maryland General Assembly in 1996 to stimulate economic development through tourism has given a terrific boost to museums and historic sites such as ours.

The initiative ultimately gave rise to the Southern Maryland Heritage Area Consortium, a catalyst for obtaining state funding for historic places and museums, recreation facilities, cultural events and projects in Calvert, Charles and St. Mary's counties.

The Southern Maryland Heritage Area Consortium (SMHAC) is managed by representatives from the tourism industry, business, museums, historic preservation groups and cultural organizations who work with SMHAC's dynamic executive director, Roz Racanello. SMHAC fields funding requests for up to \$100,000 for capital projects and smaller amounts for non-capital proposals. Its mini-grant program awards up to \$1,000 for smaller projects – a significant supplement to the budget of an organization needing to install signage, create a brochure or support a cultural event.

"I know that every Southern Marylander believes our shared heritage is of the greatest importance, not just for ourselves, but for future generations," Roz says, "It's my job to ensure that today's children and *their* children have every opportunity to experience the stories of the land and the water and the struggles of those who came before us."

SMHAC evaluates and prioritizes grant applications and then sends them on to the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority (MHAA), the government unit overseeing support for certified heritage areas, for the final evaluation and awarding of funds. SMHAC achieved the "certified status" it needed to be eligible for these precious state funds in 2003.

SMHAC has been a steady supporter of the Museum Division's grant applications to MHAA. In 2005, the Museum Division received \$25,000 to assist with the construction of the Potomac River Maritime Exhibit building at Piney Point In 2006, \$80,000 was awarded to assist with the construction of parking, walkways and a Dory boat shelter for the Piney Point complex. In 2007, MHAA, with SMHAC's endorsement, awarded the Museum Division \$75,000 to proceed with fabrication and installation of exhibits in the Potomac River Maritime Exhibit building.

Mini-grants awarded directly from SMHAC – each for \$1,000 – have included funds to the Friends for a self-guided brochure for Piney Point; a grant to the United Committee for Afro-American Contributions that, through a partnership with the Museum Division, resulted in new interpretive signs for the Drayden African American Schoolhouse; and a grant to the Friends to support continuing work on the St. Clement's Island signage project.

Brick by Brick, Potomac River Landmark Returns



Sunday, January 3, 1904: Bright and cold, ice... out as far as the flats. Bitter cold this morning. Strong breeze N.W. Willie H. and Willie F. went around shore this p.m. after ducks. Shot twice but didn't kill any.

So wrote Josephine McWilliams Freeman, the Blackistone Island lighthouse keeper, in her diary as a new year began more than one hundred years ago. The lighthouse she managed diligently for nearly 37 years later was ruined by fire and had to be demolished in 1956.

Its distinguished shape, what is known as an "integral lighthouse" — a two-story brick residence with a center entry, and windows and a porch across the front, whose light sat atop a tower smack in the middle of the house – reappeared last summer near its original location on what we now call St. Clement's Island, just one-quarter mile offshore from Colton's Point.

Members of the St. Clement's Hundred who are spearheading the rebuilding, are suspending most activity for the winter. They'll resume work as weather permits. Look for a dedication ceremony next summer.

Dear Friends,

A quick note to let you know all is well on the museum front! Projects are going well. All of the September and October events were successes for all parties involved from the Osprey Gala to the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museums Forum. Although dry, the fall weather was great for tourism and visitors and many of them have traveled through.

The Friends received a \$1,000 mini-grant from the Southern Maryland Heritage Area Consortium to continue fabricating signs for St. Clement's Island. Plans are to design and fabricate panels for the three sided framed kiosk and several lighthouse and nature trail signs.

The first two exhibit panels for the Potomac River Maritime Exhibit building should be installed before Christmas. The parking and walkway specifications for the Piney Point complex are being developed and prepared for Critical Areas reviews. The Piney Point shoreline stabilization project is almost ready to go through the St. Mary's County Department of Land Use and Growth Management review process.

The Blackistone Lighthouse is amazing to see even if it us still under construction. We hope you will join us next season as many of these projects evolve from concept plans to tangible exhibits and park features.
