**Explore Stories of Local African Americans this Black History Month at the
U.S. Colored Troops Interpretive Center**

LEONARDTOWN, MD – The public is encouraged to head to the U.S. Colored Troops (USCT) Interpretive Center in Lexington Park to explore the profound and significant contributions of African Americans in St. Mary's County this February, in honor of Black History Month.

USCT Interpretive Center exhibits will be **open and free to the public**, from **10 a.m. – 2 p.m.** every Wednesday and Saturday in February: **February 4, 7, 10, 14, 18, 21, 25 & 28**.

Inside the USCT Interpretive Center, visitors can learn about two St. Mary's County Congressional Medal of Honor recipients who served in the 38th Infantry Regiment of the U.S. Colored Troops and fought for the Union during the Civil War. These two men received the Medal of Honor for their valor and bravery at the Battle of New Market Heights, Virginia, in 1864. On the trail between the Interpretive Center in Lexington Manor Passive Park and John G. Lancaster Park, you can learn about the Civil War era in St. Mary's County and the African American troops on interpretive panels that lead to the statue of the soldier.

Staff will be available to answer questions and provide information on these amazing stories.
