Community Engagement Window (CEW) #2 (May-June)

- Total # of participants in CEW #2: 1,380
- 15 In-Person Community Engagement
 Opportunities from May 16 June 30, 2025*
- 3 content-based surveys and one exit questionnaire
- All surveys were available online from May 5 to June
 30
- Paper surveys were available at the 3 County libraries for community members to complete
- Survey questions were the same whether participants were in-person or online






Survey 2: Environmental and Agricultural ResourcesQuestion 1

Activities that participants support to protect environmentally sensitive land

67%	Investing in natural stormwater management to support healthy wetlands
63%	Purchasing land to protect shoreline areas, such as protecting vulnerable community waterfronts
51%	Purchasing conservation easements
17%	New public actions are not needed.

Support for new agricultural policies

67%	Expand the existing farm-to-school purchasing program to support stable local markets for farm products

49%	Support the development of new agricultural support uses, such as small-scale meat processing and produce packing hubs




Top priorities for transit service

About the Participants

- About 80% of respondents own their homes
- The vast majority of participants reported that they live in a single-family home
- Evenly split between groups turnout from all adult age groups, with the exception of the 15-24 age group






Working Lands

- This map includes Rural Legacy areas and agricultural easements, including Rural Legacy, Maryland Environmental Trust (MET), and Maryland Agricultural Land Preservation Foundation (MALPF).
- The Priority Preservation Area (97,660 acres) is the focus of long-term investment by the County to ensure the ongoing retention of agricultural land uses and profitability of agricultural activities.
- The goal is to preserve 80% of 97,000 acres.



Vision Themes



Introduction to Vision Themes

- The three Vision Themes are the highest-level part of the new plan's organizing structure, and capture the broadest ambitions and desires for the County's future
- The themes combine public engagement, stakeholder feedback, inputs from the Planning Commission and CSMC, and staff discussions
- They translate into the Goals, Policies, and Actions that will be used to implement the plan, and provide an overarching direction for the future of the County



Vision Theme 1: Guiding Our Growth Through 2050

Through 2050, St. Mary's County will provide a balance between preserving important natural and agricultural resources, and growing intentionally to create attractive, walkable, and connected places within designated Growth Areas. This balance will continue to provide living, working, and recreating environments for a variety of lifestyles. This includes high-tech business parks and mixed-use centers, traditional neighborhoods, retirement communities, rural farmsteads, and waterfront areas. These different places will support a diverse economic base, provide job opportunities at a variety of income levels, and support investments in housing to enable workers to find an attainable home and put down roots.



Vision Theme 2: Protecting Our Environmental and Agricultural Resources

The County's wealth of natural assets are critical elements of its heritage, economy, and quality of life. Through 2050, the County will prioritize protection of land and water resources that support multiple community planning objectives. These efforts will protect lands to maintain natural ecosystem functions. They will also protect the County's unique rural character and foster its agricultural economy. Investments in parks and open spaces will enhance livability for community members and visitors, and resiliency efforts will address vulnerability to hazards such as shoreline erosion, storm surge mitigation, and nuisance flooding.



Vision Theme 3: Serving Our Community

Maintaining a high quality of life means ensuring community members have access to effective and efficient County facilities and services. Through 2050, the County will serve all members in a manner that is balanced with the urban, suburban, or rural context where they are located. New or enhanced services and facilities will support a healthy fiscal bottom line for the County. Core services, such as public water and wastewater, will be prioritized within Development Districts and Town Centers. The County's transportation network will be improved to support priority multimodal access needs (drive, bike, walk, and transit) of the community. Human services, public health, public safety, and other public services will benefit from strategic improvements for the betterment of all community members.
